CENTRAL - Defending District 4-5A champion Central High School has dominated the Zachary Broncos for most the past seven years, but now the tables have turned.

Zachary (5-1) is one of the state's premier teams and is ranked No. 9 by the Louisiana Sportswriters Association. On the other hand, Central, which has won the district title for the past six years, is 2-4 and is coming off successive losses to Jesuit, McKinley, Scotlandville, and Denham Springs. For the first time in years, the Wildcats travel to Zachary Friday hungry for a win in their long-time classic rivalry. The teams meet at 7 p.m. at Bronco Stadium.



- 5. Cover your mouth when coughing and sneezing and wash your hands to prevent spreading germs.





Before We Were Wildcats, We Were The Demons



CENTRAL HIGH UNIFORM from the 1930's — before we were the Wildcats!

CENTRAL - The Central High that had pictures of Demons on School mascot hasn't always been them. But after the name was the Wildcat. Until the late 1930's, Central High School was known as the Demons.

On August 6, 2009, Mr. Pierce Summers, then 91, recalled the history of Central High mascots in a story by Elva Jo Crawford, written for the Central City News.

Mr. Summers said he was the official school mascot until the name was changed. As it turns out, the Demons were controversial. Many Christians in Central didn't like the word Demons, because of its association with Satan.

The issue came to a head when the school needed new uniforms for some of the sports.

The school couldn't find a busi-

changed to the Wildcat, plenty of business owners were willing to step forward and pay for the uniforms.

The Demons lived on for awhile in an unusual way. In the late 1960's and early 1970's, the school had a live wildcat as its mascot.

His nickname was Lucifer!

Today Willie the Wildcat is the school mascot. He appears at almost every Central High football and basketball game.

So far, Willie hasn't been very controversial.

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

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
